## **Devotional Thoughts**

How do you talk to your kids about sin? I think it's hard not to sound like a hypocrite when you call your children and grandchildren out for sins that you yourself have committed. What makes it even harder is if they know you've committed that sin. A conversation against premarital sex sounds strange when talking about it with a son or daughter who knows they were born out of wedlock. Encouragement for your children to raise their kids with God's word in the church rings hollow when you neglected bringing up your children in the word. Any kind of discussion on modest dress seems to fall on deaf ears when your photo albums or Facebook pages are filled with pictures of you in the past, clearly not following that advice.

Sadly, the response to this fear of hypocrisy is often silence. The parent who made mistakes in the past feels unable to speak. Maybe they'll even use the line, "They have to make their own mistakes and learn." This comes from a sense of pride, a refusal to admit to your kids that you've sinned. And I think the reason people refuse to own up to their own foolishness of the past is because they think that will give their children the moral high-ground. They are afraid that their children will lose respect for them or see them as less of a person.

Now, I'm not saying that you need to divulge every sin of your youth to your kids. There's a reason why during Confession and Absolution in the worship service we confess that we are sinners to each other and God instead of confessing all the grotesque thoughts, words, and actions we've produced in the last week. It's because sinful people don't forgive and forget like God does. That why when we do confess individual sins before other people, we make sure it's someone who will show us Jesus' forgiveness and not weaponize this secret against us. ### Musical energy and talent a highlight at the National Worship Conference

After a seven-year hiatus, rather than the three-year pattern that began in 1996, it's not surprising that this year's conference unleashed a lot of musical energy and talent. One first-time attendee said, "I had heard it would be awesome, but it far exceeded my expectations." Some regular past attendees said "best ever" about the caliber of the orchestra . . . and the superb cafeteria menu choices.

The conference theme was "Sing to the Lord a New Song." While the song of the gospel is always new, this conference made extensive use of new songs from the 2021 WELS hymnal suite and beyond, accompanied by a wide variety of instruments in different styles.

Those who couldn't attend can still enjoy concerts and services at welsworshipconference.net/media. This link also includes service folders, some presentation handouts, and photos. While the impact from these videos isn't the same as being present with 1,000 people (like a photo of the Grand Canyon can't compete with standing at the rim), viewers can still enjoy these events. Here are some "not to miss" items:

- Festival concert: Don't miss the thrilling final movement of Saint Saens' "Organ Symphony" and excellent choral music from a 115-voice choir.
- Plenary address: Jonathan Bauer presented "Lutheran Worship: What Now?" In a context of rapid change, Bauer demonstrates how, as we, confessional Lutherans, are fully equipped to answer this crucial question. It's available in both video and print.
- Morning "Alive in Christ" sermons: Hear sermons by Prof. Aaron Christie (Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary), President Richard Gurgel (Martin Luther College), and President em. Paul Wendland (Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary).
- Closing concert: A rendition of "Amazing Grace" starts with a whisper from the children's choir (50 voices singing with beautiful tone) accompanied by harp, handbells, and flute. It keeps building until the last stanza, a sonic roar from 1,200 people, full orchestra with lots of percussion, and a kilt-clad bagpiper. (The hymn begins at 1:15 in the video)

The conference wasn't only for musicians and pastors. Non-musical laypeople from congregations of all sizes selected from many presentation topics. A first-time non-musical attendee said, "My wife twisted my arm to come, but I won't miss another!"

But if the young men and women you are raising know about your past, don't shy away from it. These are sins you have been forgiven for. It does not mean you are proud of them, but it does mean that you no longer carry the shame. Don't shy away from talking about sin. Whether it makes you uncomfortable or not call it out head-on.

"You cannot bless sin." These were the words of an Anglican deacon as he debated the truth of God's word over in England. The statement is true. But it doesn't stop people from trying to bless sin. They'll try to get around sin, looking for a church or a spiritual leader who downplays their sin and tells them it's ok. They'll try to run away from it, thinking that if they stay away from God's word, then they won't have to hear about their misdeeds. But no one class bless sin. No one can make it better. No one but God. There is only one way out of sin. It's the cross. It's there that we come to grips with the complete ruin sin has brought to our souls. And it's there that we find true forgiveness. There's no escaping sin. There's no blessing sin. There is only forgiving sin, and that's what God does.

As your prepare your kids to live as sinners in this sinful world, don't sidestep the fact that your life is filled with your sin and God's grace. Don't try and bless sin. Embrace its realities. Tell your kids what is right and wrong in God's sight, encourage them to live in thanks for him, and when they inevitably sin, be quick to show them their sin and even quicker to show them the Savior whose blood paid for that sin.
