Devotional Thoughts

By the time you read this devotion, you are probably gearing up to go to the polls for the November 5th election. Maybe you've already early voted or sent in your mail-in ballot. My words here are not to tell you who you should vote for or even that you ought to vote. Our church is a-political. We do not put signs out in front of the church, hand out pamphlets comparing candidates, or participate in "souls to the polls"-type programs. What we do is preach Christ. And preaching Christ means taking to heart what God says about the different questions of life, and leaving matters up to Christian freedom when God is silent in his word. So, let's address some of the questions a person might wrestle with every election season and see what God tells us in his word:

1) Is voting a duty or a right?

Jesus is clear that citizens owe their government what is due them (Matthew 22:21, Mark 12:17). It is God-pleasing for a Christian to pay his or her tax bill or for men to register for selective service in compliance with the law. There are many other instances where citizens do what their government requires to honor God by honoring his gift of worldly authority. But voting is not one of these instances. Unlike some other countries, the United States does not place a legal requirement on voting. An American Christian is free to vote or not vote. And the exercise of that right does not make them any more or less of a Christian. At the same time, a Christian should recognize the special blessing God has given them to be able to participate in their own government. As they prepare for any election, they should not be flippant about their vote, understanding that they people they choose have a God-given role, one we'll hear more about in the next section.

Hurricane Milton and Hurricane Helene updates

This weekend, Oct. 12 and 13, the WELS Christian Aid and Relief assessment team traveled to Florida and spent two intensive days viewing damage and talking to pastors, members, and church leaders. The team visited WELS congregations in Sarasota, Tampa, and Seminole. Northdale Lutheran in Tampa had a large tree on its school that needed to be removed as well as water damage to its sound system. Ascension in Sarasota had soffit damage. Thankfully damage to church buildings is light and should be repaired quickly.

The team also visited several members of WELS churches with varying levels of damage to their personal properties. Some have extensive damage from storm surge entering their homes. There is also quite a bit of tree damage and debris that needs to be cleaned up in the area of impact. Christian Aid and Relief is thankful to report that all members of our churches are safe with no reports of injury or loss of life.

Currently, Christian Aid and Relief is working to set up a deployment to help with the work that needs to be done. Local volunteers will be utilized as much as possible, but volunteers with special skills will be brought in as needed. To sign up as a disaster relief volunteer, please visit welsdisasterrelief.org. Christian Aid and Relief will keep you updated on its deployment plans.

In addition to the work in Florida, Christian Aid and Relief is in touch with WELS pastors in North Carolina and is working to help several families in need.

2) How do I separate my Christian beliefs from my political opinions in the voting booth?

Let me ask you to look at it from a different perspective. The truth is, there is not a Christian you and a secular you. In everything you do, you are going to be influenced by the truth of God's word. But God does not speak directly about every topic of life. When it comes to matters such as murder, theft, and sexual immorality, God speaks clearly (Exodus 20:13-15). These things are sins that have a destructive effect on society. But how the government should punish these behaviors might be a source of disagreement among Christians. So, let me put it simply: when you go to cast your ballot, you will inevitably be shaped in part by the black and white truths of God's word. But you will also have to make judgements on what issues you think are most important and how the government carries out its duty of keeping peace, promoting good, and hindering evil (Philippians 1:9-10, 1 Peter 2:13 -14). That will lead our family of believers to fill out their ballots differently, and that's ok.

3) Is there one candidate that God prefers over the other?

The answer to this question is "yes," but probably not in the way you think. It is true that God places rulers into their places of authority (Romans 13:1-4). God is not hands-off when it comes to the goings-on of the world. And, yes, that means that God even installs tyrants and despots into their roles of authority. But he works through those leaders (and sometimes in spite of them) to accomplish his purposes in the world. Look at the many examples of bad rulers used for God's good purposes throughout Bible history. God has already chosen who will represent our country in the various offices we elect men and women to serve in. But here's the thing: God has not revealed the "who" to us. And this should give us peace, whether we cast a ballot or not and whether the candidates we support win or don't. Ultimately, God is on his throne, and though we use our Christian wisdom and Christian freedom to participate in our government and further our thoughts and ideas, he is the one in control.

As the noise around this election reaches a fever pitch, remember that your salvation won't be found in the ballot box. As it always is, it's found at the cross. Pray for the candidates who win the upcoming elections and are tasked with the important task of governance. Whether you gave them your vote or not, they are your elected leaders and God's representatives in your life. And for the peace and security they provide, give thanks to God that he has provided these securities through our government for generations. Pray that they continue still for generations.
